


The Berkshire area

- Berkshire stretches from Hungerford in the West to Slough in the East.




Wokingham and Reading emerge as wage leaders in Berkshire

- Wokingham and Reading have the highest median hourly wage at £16.63 and £16.57. The annual median wages are £29,240 and £29,361.
- Slough has the lowest median hourly wage at £15.86.
- Windsor and Maidenhead present the lowest annual median wage at £27,964.

Professional Occupations dominate the Job Market in Berkshire and GB

Key facts

- The most common occupation in Berkshire is 'Professional' (33%)
- Followed by 'Associate Professional' (18%)
- Then 'Managers,
 Directors and Senior
 Officials' (11%)



Top 10 Unique Job Postings and Occupations in Berkshire


- There is a high demand for tech professionals, with 9,635 unique postings for Programmers and Software Development Professionals.
- Nurses are also in high demand, with 6,181 postings.


NHS leads as Top Employer in Berkshire

- The NHS is the largest employer in Berkshire, providing 16,500 jobs.
- Vodafone, a major player in the telecommunications sector, sustains a workforce of 5,000.
- The University of Reading is a major educational and research institution, employing 4,000 staff.



NHS is Berkshire's Top Job Posting

- The NHS has the highest number, with 11,008 unique job postings.
- The data shows a broad range of sectors, including technology, recruitment, and public sector
- Tech companies are high in job postings, reflecting the industry's growth.



There are several different types of work in Berkshire: Self-employment, SME's, Part-time Working & Portfolio Careers

Selfemployment

9.0%

Of people working in Berkshire are selfemployed. Selfemployment is highest amongst those in skilled trades including construction roles and process, plant, and machine operatives.

SME's

99.4%

of registered businesses in Berkshire are small or medium-sized enterprises.

Part-time Working

26.5%

of those in employment aged 16-64 work part-time.

Private Sector

89.4%

of Berkshire residents work in the private sector.

Public Sector

10.6%

in the public sector including the NHS, schools, local government, and emergency services

Portfolio Careers

More and more young people in Berkshire have a second job and enjoy flexible working, thereby suggesting portfolio careers are becoming popular.

Diversity and Inclusion in the Workplace in Berkshire

Key facts

- Berkshire is more inclusive than the UK average.
- When compared to the national average, Berkshire exhibits a higher employment rate for white UK nationals.


- In Berkshire, **72.2% of women** aged 16-64 were employed in the workforce compared to **78.8% of men**.
- 11.7% of Berkshire's workforce were aged 16-24 in 2022. The employment rate for younger age groups (20-24) is substantially lower, at 67.0%, respectively.
- 13.8% of the workforce in Berkshire were non-UK nationals in 2022, up from 12.4% in 2009 (compared to 12.4% nationally in 2022 and 7.7% nationally in 2009).
- The employment rate for white non-UK nationals in Berkshire is similar to the national average, both standing above 80%. However, **ethnic minorities** in Berkshire has a **higher employment rate** compared to the national average for ethnic minorities, whether UK nationals (76% vs. 70.4%) or not (73% vs. 67.2%).

Science, Technology, Engineering, and Maths (STEM) are Key in Berkshire

Key facts

- In Berkshire, STEM occupations represent only 10 % of Berkshire, yet they generated 27% GVA and 29% capital income of Berkshire in 2019.
- Technology is the leading STEM industry, employing 41,879 individuals.



Science: Chemical Scientists, Biological Scientists and Biochemists, Physical Scientists, Natural and Social Science, Laboratory Technicians, and Protective Service Associate.

Technology: Natural and Social Science Professionals, Programmers and Software Development Professionals, Environment Professionals, IT Specialist Managers, IT Project and Programme Managers, IT Business Analysts, Architects and System Designers, Web Design and Development Professionals, Information Technology and Telecommunication Professionals, Conservation Professionals, Research and Development Managers, Conservation and Environmental Associate Professionals.


Engineering: Civil Engineers, Mechanical Engineers, Electrical Engineers, Electronics Engineers, Design and Development Engineers, Production and Process Engineers, Engineering Professionals.

Math: Actuaries, Economists and Statisticians, and Chartered Surveyors.

Higher demand for Bachelor's Degrees in Berkshire

Key facts


- Berkshire's job market uniquely stands out with a 13% demand for Bachelor's degree holders, surpassing the GB average of 9%.
- If you have a Bachelor's degree, you can meet **94%** of job education requirements.



A Highly Educated Berkshire: 41% Attain Level 4 qualifications or above

Key facts

- A significant portion of Berkshire's population, 41.31%, possesses Level 4 qualifications or higher.
- Residents with Level 2 and Level 3 qualifications (13.21% and 16.51%, respectively) form a considerable part of the population.

- Computer Network Support
- Assistant Manager
- Graphic Designer
- Laboratory Technician

No qualifications: no formal qualifications

Level 1: one to four GCSE passes (grade A*to C or grade 4 and above) and any other GCSEs at other grades, or equivalent qualifications


Level 2: five or more GCSE passes (grade A* to C or grade 4 and above) or equivalent qualifications apprenticeships

Level 3: two or more A Levels or equivalent qualifications

Level 4 or above: Higher National Certificate, Higher National Diploma, Bachelor's degree, or postgraduate qualifications

Young workforce gravitates towards Technical Roles


- Associate professional and technical occupations are the leading fields for young adults
- employment area for those aged 16-24, with 7,509 individuals employed.



High demand for Communication and Detail-Oriented Skills

Key facts


- The most significant tech skills shortages are observed in Computer Literacy and Mathematics, with a gap of 8,790 and 4,926 between job postings and profile skills.
- Top demanded **soft skills** are **Communications** and **Detail Oriented**, with a gap of 39,018 and 20,240.



Excess talent in Management, Sales and Customer Service Skills

Key facts

- An oversupply in Management skills is evident with 23,763 more profiles than job postings.
- Sales and Customer Service profiles exceed job postings by 32,716 and 20,871.
- Microsoft Office and Excel show significant surpluses of 20,899 and 11,914.



The main common skills Berkshire employers are looking for

- The skill with the highest number of job postings is Communications, with 68,096 postings.
- Management skills are the second most sought after with 49,954 postings, followed by Customer Service at 39,292 postings.



High demand for Nursing and Microsoft Azure skills

Key facts


- The **largest** shortage is observed in Nursing (3,937).
- There is a significant shortage of specialised IT skills, particularly in Python Programming (1,870), JavaScript (1,740), Amazon Web Services (1,937), and Microsoft Azure (3,234).



Excess talent in Management, Business and Marketing skills

Key facts

- Skills with the highest surplus, are in the areas of Project Management (25,874), Business Development (19,294), and Account Management (18,970).
- Marketing (13,476),
 Sales Management
 (14,457), and Selling
 Techniques (2,782) have
 a high surplus.



The main specialised skills Berkshire employers are looking for


- Agile Methodology (9,828 postings) and JavaScript (5,328 postings) lead in demand within the technology sector.
- Business and Financial Expertise: Finance (15,313 postings) and Accounting (10,494 postings) are skills with the highest number of job postings.



Education leads Apprenticeship Postings in Berkshire

Key facts


- The Education industry surfaced as the leading sector with the highest number of unique apprenticeship postings (127).
- There was significant interest in apprentices within Computer Programming and Related Activities (82 postings).



Reading dominates Apprenticeship postings in Berkshire

Key facts

- Reading leads with 1,668 postings. The second-highest area is Slough, with 493 postings.
- Other areas such as Wokingham, Bracknell, and Windsor show relatively similar numbers of postings, ranging from 184 to 207.



High-paying and niche jobs in Berkshire you may not be aware of...

Key facts

 High-tech roles in computer facilities management and satellite telecommunications are not only niche but also highly remunerated, with average wages exceeding £55,000.

Jobs local employers find difficult to fill

Key facts

Job positions that employers in Berkshire find most difficult to fill include engineers; social workers; chefs; waiting and bar staff; software developers; lorry drivers; health workers; teachers and Apprentices.

• "We are short of website coders; RPA project managers/coders; sales order processors; customer service agents; international shipping advisers; and warehouse operatives"

 "Nursing vacancies increased over 41% from Dec 19 to Dec 20 and care and home worker vacancies increased 33% in the same period"

The main employability skills Berkshire employers are looking For

- 27% of Berkshire employers who recruit school leavers believe they are **poorly prepared** for work.
- Of these, 12% say they believe young people have a poor attitude / lack motivation. So whilst most don't think this, a fair chunk do.

- Share the most wanted common skills of Communication, Good Work Ethic, Time keeping and problem solving skills.


